Maritza earned a spot in the 1997 USA National Junior Team. In 1999, she became the U.S. National Champion in the 50-meter freestyle in the 18 and under age group and was named Florida High School State Champion six times. She swam at University of Georgia where she excelled and quickly proved to be a strong contender for the 2000 Olympic team after she won the 200 freestyle at the NCAA Championships. Maritza did not earn a spot onto Olympic team in 2000.

Maritza continued training and earned an Olympic silver medal in 2004 as part of the 400m free relay team, adding another historical accomplishment to her already impressive swimming resume. After the Olympics, Maritza also became the American record holder in the 50y free and 100y free, and an 11-time NCAA Champion and 27-time NCAA All American. She is still the only swimmer, male or female, to win an SEC title in every freestyle event and was the 2003 University of Georgia Student-Athlete of the year. She graduated in 2005 with a degree in sociology.
